For the third year in a row, Davis will be hosting the eclectic confederation of activist street musicians and buskers known collectively as Honk! For their annual Honk! Fest from October 9th to the 11th. The onomatopoeic name refers to both the subversive philosophy that underlies the spirit of the festival—that their music is an announcement and warning to their fellow travelers-and how they literally express their message—by honking, waving or thumping at everything in the vicinity.

Last year, Tufts held a Honk! symposium, giving the festival some pretty solid chops with the academes—and the DIY nature means everyone who attends is a potential participant.
